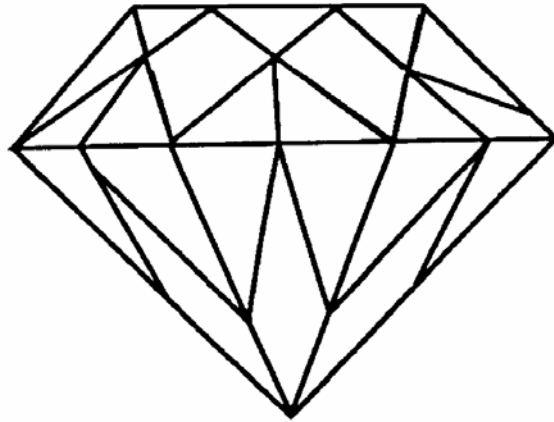

in the State of Arkansas.

April Term AD 1853

This day the clerk of this court presented to this court the assessment list which had been filed by Abner B. Williams, Sheriff pro-tempore of Pike County.

Whereupon it is considered and ordered by the court that a State tax of one-fourth of one per centum and a County tax of one-fifth per centum be levied on all taxable property and that a Poll tax be levied on all persons subject to such tax of twenty-five cents.

Do you recognize anyone?

Jeanie Brown sent this picture and would like some help identifying the people. Here is what is known about the picture. The photo was taken around 1937; probably at the Jim Sherron homestead in Calhoun County, AR. There is a possibility that the photo was taken at home of Jim's brother, John Shirron, in Holly Springs, Dallas County, AR. It is a gathering of the Sherron and Brown families. The marriage of William Henry Brown to Etta Beatrice Sherron connected the two families.

Here are the identifications we've made on the persons in the photo: 2nd row, seated 3rd & 4th from Left - James C. Sherron & wife, Cynthia Catherine Machen. We think the gent with the mustache in 2nd row 9th from left, is John Shirron [the brother's spelled the surname differently]. Third row, 2nd from left is Vercie Irene Brown, d/o Wm. H. & Beatrice Sherron Brown. She married Charles Glenn Seefluth. Row [3] - 4th from left is Edna Sarah Sherron, younger sister of Beatrice; she married Leroy Ethridge. Same row [#3] 6th from left, is Myrtle Brown, d/o William H. & Beatrice Sherron Brown; Myrtle married George Walter Holmes. Again in row [3] - 9th from left in dark dress with brooches on dress front, is Etta Beatrice Sherron d/o James C. Sherron & Cynthia /Synthia Catherine Machen. Same row [#3] 11th from left, is Ivy Marie Brown d/o Wm. H. & Beatrice Sherron Brown. Ivy married James Douglas Watson. She is holding Nadine Watson, her daughter. William Henry Brown, husband of Beatrice Sherron, is located in the back row, 3rd from left -- behind Edna Sherron. These are all the people we can identify. Any help with the other folks would be appreciated. Samuel Early Brown, brother of William Henry Brown, settled

in Delight, Pike County, AR and raised his family there. He died in 1940 so it is possible he is in this photo. Certainly there are many Sherron's in the picture. Let's ID them.

They had no children, but raised a nephew Johnnie Kirkham, son of Christopher Kirkham and Effie Cloud. "Mrs. Alice Kelley, aged about 75, died in the state hospital at Little Rock, Monday (January 24, 1943). She had been in ill health for several years and had been confined to the hospital several months. She has lived here for many years. She is survived by one brother, Jim Kirkham, of this place. Also several other near relatives and friends. Funeral services were conducted at the church of Christ here Tuesday by J.A. Copeland, local minister. Burial was in the local cemetery." **K.K.K. Members Visit Baptist Revival in
Glenwood**

**Quoted from the Arkadelphia Southern
Standard, August 9, 1923**

Dear Old Standard:

On the last night of our protracted Baptist meeting after the preacher had taken his text and gotten fairly well started in his subject five of the white hooded gentlemen, known

as the K.K.K., came marching in at the door in single file, halted at the pulpit, the leader about as tall as Abe Lincoln, and handed the preacher a note which he opened and read to the public and which read in part like this: *We, the committee K. K. K. No. 28, desire to commend the efforts of Elder H. E. Kirkpatrick in his series of meetings at this place. We believe in the Christian religion, hence enclose a small contribution of \$10. We believe in white supremacy, closer relationship between labor and capital; we believe in protection of our pure womanhood; we believe in preventing mob*

violence and lynching; we believe in upholding the Constitution of the United States. After reading, the speaker commented on the principles of the note and indorsed its principles, one of the white hooded gentlemen bowed and they turned about face, and left as silently as they came in. I didn't hear anyone breathing like they were scared almost to death and wanted the camphor bottle quick. But of all the public comment for the next two or three days as to who they were, where from and their purpose, it beat the band to listen at it.

Our Glenwood Chamber of Commerce met the other night and decided to have a fair and poultry show and Caddo River bridge celebration. At their next meeting they will formulate plans to that end.

Mrs. Alph Bridges of Arkadelphia has returned home after spending two weeks here with her son, Fred, and his wife and their beautiful baby. Her son is one of the managing bosses of the big steel bridge here on the Caddo that they are making every effort possible to complete this summer and have it ready for the fall traffic. Mrs. Bridges very much endeared herself to some of our Glenwood citizens while sojourning here with the children.

I see in last week's Standard where Ben Key and wife of Fla., Mrs. J. G. and G. W. Clark spent Sunday in Okolona with Chas. Clark. Seeing these names carries me back to the '60s and '70s when we were boys together around old South Fork church and neighborhood, and, yes those were happy days for us boys when we would go in bathing in the overflow in Terre Noir bottom and play in the hot water and hot sun 'til our backs would blister so we couldn't hardly wear a shirt for a week. Lucille Westbrook

Lucille Westbrook of Nashville, Ark., died Saturday, Jan. 31, 2004, in Nashville. She lived in the second oldest home in Nashville and in sight of Nashville's first Post Office, the home of her maternal grandfather, Burton Parker. This home is on the National Register of Historic Places.

She was born May 12, 1918, in Nathan, Ark., the daughter of the late Walter and Wincie Parker Westbrook. A graduate of Nashville High School, she was one of the founders of the Southwest Arkansas Regional

Archives in Washington, where she volunteered for 22 years and served as Director of the Archives from 1990-2002. She was a charter member and former Regent of Mine Creek Chapter of the DAR in Nashville.

She was a board member of the Howard County Library System and had served as president for an extended time. She was Howard County Historian for many years and oversaw "From the Early Files" in the "Nashville News", publishing a historic photograph from her personal collection and from loaned photographs each week.

Miss Westbrook was very active in the restoration and preservation movement in historic Washington, Ark., acquiring and donating property to the Pioneer Washington Foundation, including the Augustus Crouch house, the George Peck house and the Foundation Headquarters, historic buildings that made significant contributions to the historic Washington scene.

She was retired from the U.S. Corps of Engineers, and had worked in the Arkansas office of U.S. Senator J. William Fulbright during his last six years in office. During that time she became a mentor and friend to a young Bill Clinton, David Pryor and Jim Guy Tucker. She was a member of the Democratic Party and had served many times as an election official in the Democratic primaries and general elections in Howard County.

Miss Westbrook was preceded in death by a brother, James Allen Westbrook.

Survivors include: her brother, Parker Westbrook of Nashville, Ark., as well as many other cousins and legions of friends.

Graveside services were at 2 p.m. Monday, Feb. 2, 2004, in the Nashville Cemetery. Dr. John L. Ferguson, Dr. David Blasé and Senator David Pryor officiated.

Richard Jeanes, Hayden Worthington, Eddie Roe, Michael Reed, Brandon Owen and Dwayne Gray served as pallbearers.

Visitation was from 5 until 7 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 1, 2004, at Latimer Funeral Home in Nashville.

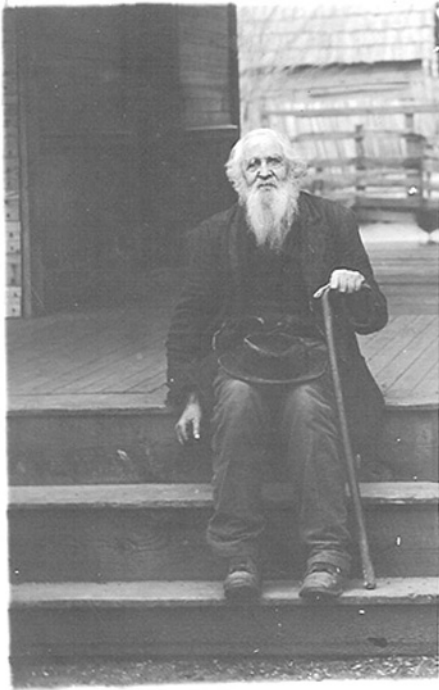

I have a little more information to add about Uncle Doc Roberts. I'm also a descendant of William Jackson Roberts, like Larry Roberts, but down through a different child.

Uncle Doc first appears in the 1860

census, at 9 years of age. He may have had a twin brother named Robert, who is listed at the same age. Incredibly, his name is listed in the census as "Doctor P.C. Roberts", despite the fact that he is only nine. Apparently, his given name was Doctor. I have no idea what the P.C. stood for.

As Larry states, little is known of Uncle Doc. Family history has it that Uncle Doc was not quite 100% in the head. He would wander around from family member to family member, with the bird on his shoulder. I don't know how James Perry Burnham is related to Claus Burnham, but James was married to Julia Daisy Roberts, Uncle Doc's niece and daughter of W.J. Roberts. This fact may explain why the picture ended up in the Claus Burnham estate.

This is a great picture, and one I had not seen. I'm in the process of assembling and scanning hundreds of old family pictures and this one will add very nicely to the other two I have of Uncle Doc. Based on one of the other pictures, I would place the date of the picture you have as around 1920.

REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER'S GRAVE MARKING TO BE HIGHLIGHT OF STANDRIDGE REUNION

The Standridge National Family History Society, founded in 1989, will dedicate a marker at the site of the grave of NC Revolutionary Soldier, Pvt. James Standridge, during its 2004 national family reunion scheduled for Sept. 24 - 26, 2004. The reunion headquarters will be in Greenville, SC. Standridge, who died in 1837, served in the NC militia during the War against the Cherokee, allies of the British, before moving

to western SC. His descendants have been searching for his unmarked burial place for several decades. However, recently, a small entry was located in the original records of the Holly Springs Baptist Church in Oconee County, SC suggested that he and his wife were buried in the cemetery located beside the church. A fitting ceremony for an American patriot, with color guard, Revolutionary War re-enactors, and local dignitaries, is planned. James Standridge's descendants, numbering in the thousands, are scattered across the country. Many of his descendants settled in Montgomery, Polk, and Pike counties in Arkansas. The Standridge National Family History Society helps them stay in touch by publishing a newsletter and sponsoring national reunion every two years.
